We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Middle East Forum (a non-profit organization), which comprise the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2014 and 2013, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

#### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. ## NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### DECEMBER 31, 2014 AND 2013

#### NOTE A - SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A summary of the Organization's significant accounting policies consistently applied in the preparation of the accompanying financial statements follows:

#### 1. Nature of activities

The Middle East Forum (the Organization) is a non-profit organization that (1) promotes American interests in the Middle East and (2) protects Western values from Middle Eastern threats. The Organization's work includes research, publications, educational programs, media outreach, activism, and networking. The Organization's support comes primarily through donations.

### 2. Basis of accounting

The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payables, and other liabilities.

## 3. Basis of presentation

Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets.

#### 4. <u>Cash and cash equivalents</u>

The Organization considers all highly liquid instruments with a maturity of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents. Cash and cash equivalents for purposes of the statement of cash flows exclude permanently restricted cash and cash equivalents.

#### 5. Public support and revenue

Annual campaign contributions are generally available for unrestricted use in the related campaign year unless specifically restricted by the donor. Grants and other contributions of cash and other assets are reported as temporarily restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. Contributions received with donor-imposed restrictions that are met in the same year in which the contributions are received are classified as unrestricted contributions.

## 5. <u>Public support and revenue (continued)</u>

Contributions of donated non cash assets are recorded at their fair value in the period received. Contributions of donated services that create or enhance non financial assets or that require specialized skills, are provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased if not provided by donation, are recorded at their fair values in the period received.

#### 6. Property and equipment

It is the Organization's policy to capitalize property and equipment over \$500. Lesser amounts are expensed. Purchased property and equipment is capitalized at cost. Donations of property and equipment are recorded as contributions at their estimated fair value. Such donations are reported as unrestricted contributions unless the donor has restricted the donated asset to a specific purpose. Assets donated with explicit restrictions regarding their use and contributions of cash that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as restricted contributions. Absent donor stipulations regarding how long those donated assets must be maintained, the Organization reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service as instructed by the donor. The Organization reclassifies temporarily restricted net assets to unrestricted net assets at that time. Property and equipment are depreciated using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lines of the assets. Depreciation expense at December 31, 2014 and 2013 was \$9,116 and \$8,767.

#### 7. <u>Use of Estimates</u>

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires the use of management's estimates.

#### 8. <u>Investments</u>

Investments are composed of equity securities and are carried at their fair value. Investment income and realized and urealized gains and losses are reported as increase or decrease in unrestricted net assets absent any donor restrictions.

## 9. Functional Allocation of Expenses

The costs of providing the various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

The Organization adopted FASB ASC 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures, for assets and liabilities measured at fair value on a recurring basis. The codification established a common definition for fair value to be applied to existing generally accepted accounting principles that requires the use of fair value measurements, establishes a framework for measuring fair value, and expands disclosure about such fair value measurements.

FASB ASC 820 defines fair value as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date and establishes a framework for measuring fair value. Additionally, FASB ASC 820 establishes a three-level hierarchy for fair value measurements based upon the transparency of inputs to the valuation of an asset or liability as of the measurement date. The three levels are defined as follows:

#### NOTE B - INVESTMENTS (CONTINUED)

Level 1 - inputs to the valuation methodology are quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets.

Level 2- inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets, and inputs that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly, for substantially the full term of the financial instrument.

Level 3 - inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

A financial instrument's categorization within the valuation hierarchy is based upon the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement.

#### NOTE C - LOAN RECEIVABLE

Loan receivable from a professional entity to be repaid from proceeds from a settlement, judgment or arbitration award that provides attorneys' fees. The loan is uncollateralized with no stated interest rate. The organization has committed to loan the entity up to a maximum of \$250,000.

#### NOTE D - INCOME TAXES

The Organization was granted tax exempt status under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Therefore no provision for income taxes has been made in these financial statements. The Organization has also been classified as an entity that is not a private foundation within the meaning of Section 509(1) and qualifies for deductible contributions as provided in Section 170(b)(1)(A)(vi).

#### NOTE F - RESTRICTED FUNDS

In 2008, the Organization established The Middle East Forum Education Fund to support researchers, writers, moderate Muslims, investigators, and activists whose work focuses on the Middle East and Islam. The education fund accounted for 65% and 76% of the organizations program services for 2014 and 2013.

In 2014, the Organization established the Foundation for the Middle east Forum (FMEF) to provide a vehicle for estate, lifetime and testamentary gifts.

#### NOTE G - COMMITMENTS

The Organization leases its office facility under a non-cancellable operating lease that expires on August 31, 2020. The Organization also leases office equipment under non-cancelable operating leases which expire on various dates thru 2017. Rent expense charged to operations for the years ended December 31, 2014 and 2013 was \$61,521 and \$67,513.

### NOTE H - CONCENTRATION OF RISK

As of the balance sheet dates, balances of cash and cash equivalents at financial institutions exceeded the federally insured limit of \$250,000 by \$571,862 in 2014 and \$1,906,489 in 2013. These balances fluctuate greatly during the year and can exceed the \$250,000 limit.

#### NOTE I - UNCERTAIN TAX PROVISION

During the years ended December 31, 2014 and 2013, the Organization did not incur any interest or penalties on its tax returns. The Organization's tax returns are subject to possible examinations by the taxing authorities for federal and state tax purposes and essentially remain open for possible examination for a period of three years after the respective filing deadlines of those returns.

#### NOTE J - DATE OF MANAGEMENT REVIEW

Subsequent events were evaluated through July 31, 2015, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.
